Math

We had a lot of fun learning about factors and making factor rainbows. They are now a beautiful decoration underneath the windows in our classroom. We learned how to locate

common factors and the greatest common factor in a set of numbers. Additionally, we have enjoyed lessons on prime and composite numbers. The children identified all of the prime numbers from 1-100 and we made reference charts to keep in our V.I.P. folders. We are now learning about multiples.





Reading

This month we have strengthened our understanding of the three types of connections. In book-to-self connections, we connect something in a text to our own personal experiences. In book-to-world connections, we connect something in the book to something we know about in the world around us. In book-to-book connections, we connect one text to another. The students have practiced making connections in their Reader's Notebooks as well as during our literature circles. We have begun examining inferences. I shared a demonstration to introduce this new concept. The blue water represents the text evidence and the yellow water represents our prior knowledge, or schema. It's only when both components act together that one can make an inference. Thus, the green water, an inference, is formed when we locate text evidence and reflect on that evidence using our prior knowledge. We practiced this skill with a mysterious fantasy story called, The Stranger, by Chris Van Allsburg. In the end, we inferred that the stranger was Jack Frost.





Writing

We have continued our study of opinion writing this month. We brainstormed some of our favorite things, wants for the future, and topics we feel passionate about debating. We utilized the analogy of an Oreo cookie to help us learn how to structure our opinion writing pieces. This piece of writing will become a delicious, multi paragraph work of art.



Spelling
